





 - FS are transnational and failures are systemic




- Food chain
 - transferring food energy from the producers, through a series of organisms (herbivores to carnivores to decomposers)
- Sustainibility
 - sustainable farming and agriculture means that they are undertaken in a way that meets the present needs without compromising the ability to meet the future ones




The EU framework initiative on sustainable food systems

The veterinary role in promoting and implementing sustainability and biodiversity

- vets are strategically positioned at the animalhuman-environment interface and can provide a wide range of sustainability services to society






The veterinary key sustainability services

- improving animal welfare and animal health
 - reduce food chain waste associated with livestock disease
 - reduce carbon footprint (modify enteric fermentation)
- supporting protection (health and welfare) of wildlife species their habitats and biodiversity

The Federation of Veterinarians of Europe (FVE) - representing around 300,000 veterinarians across 39 European countries - aims to enhance animal health, animal welfare, public health and to protect the environment by promoting the veterinary profession. The FVE and the European veterinary profession play a key role in One Health, animal health, animal welfare and public health.

Introduction

The livestock sector contributes substantially to the European economy and is a key component of the agri-food systems¹.

Veterinarians are special advisors to livestock farmers and keepers and are fully committed to sustainable livestock and aquaculture production by promoting day-by-day animal health and welfare, public health and protecting the ecosystems². Veterinarians contribute to keeping EU food at a global gold standard³ by:

- Advising and supporting farmers through the transfer of knowledge, skills, and competencies;
- Enforcing legislation;
- Applying innovation and effective technologies throughout food supply networks;
- Providing scientific support to policy-makers and decision-makers;

Throughout this paper, FVE intends to provide a list of the most important areas where the veterinary sector actively contributes to sustainable food systems throughout the promotion of animal health, welfare and public health. FVE points to the need to further invest in these crucial areas as they represent the backbone for improved sustainability, global health and security.

Way forward

- Ensure a <u>WISE</u> shift towards digital animal agriculture
- Improve the 'One Health' perspective
- Keeping the livestock sector efficient, diseases free, welfare friendly and trusted by consumers
- Continue to make responsible use of antibiotics
- Reduce the climate footprint of farming
- Increase organic production (by 25%).


Take home message

- key emerging threat of the planet (e.g. climate change) is not more solely viewed with an anthropocentric perspectives but with an impact on non-human species under the guard of the vet profession
- the animal farming has environmental, animal welfare, human and animal health consequences
- even if the veterinary profession could be considered a part of the problem, is also the solution, particularly in advising farmers and prescribing good farming practices in line with the sustainability objectives.
- the vet profession is re-defining its roles in society for a sustainable future and fall under the scope of the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) framework (e.g. animal welfare).


